Highlights of the Year

Global Symposium

More than 80 people from UNCG and local community participated in this inaugural event that celebrated global learning and research. Faculty, staff, and students were recognized for their contributions in global learning.

Fulbright TEA and Community Engagement

UNC Greensboro was one of 7 universities in the U.S. selected to implement Fulbright TEA for the third consecutive year. This program positively impacts UNCG, the larger Greensboro community, and communities in more than 30 countries around the world. This is a collaboration between GEO, the School of Education, and Guilford County Schools

UNC Greensboro continues to be a leader in this area. GEO supports students in receiving this prestigious national awards for their study abroad transformational experiences.

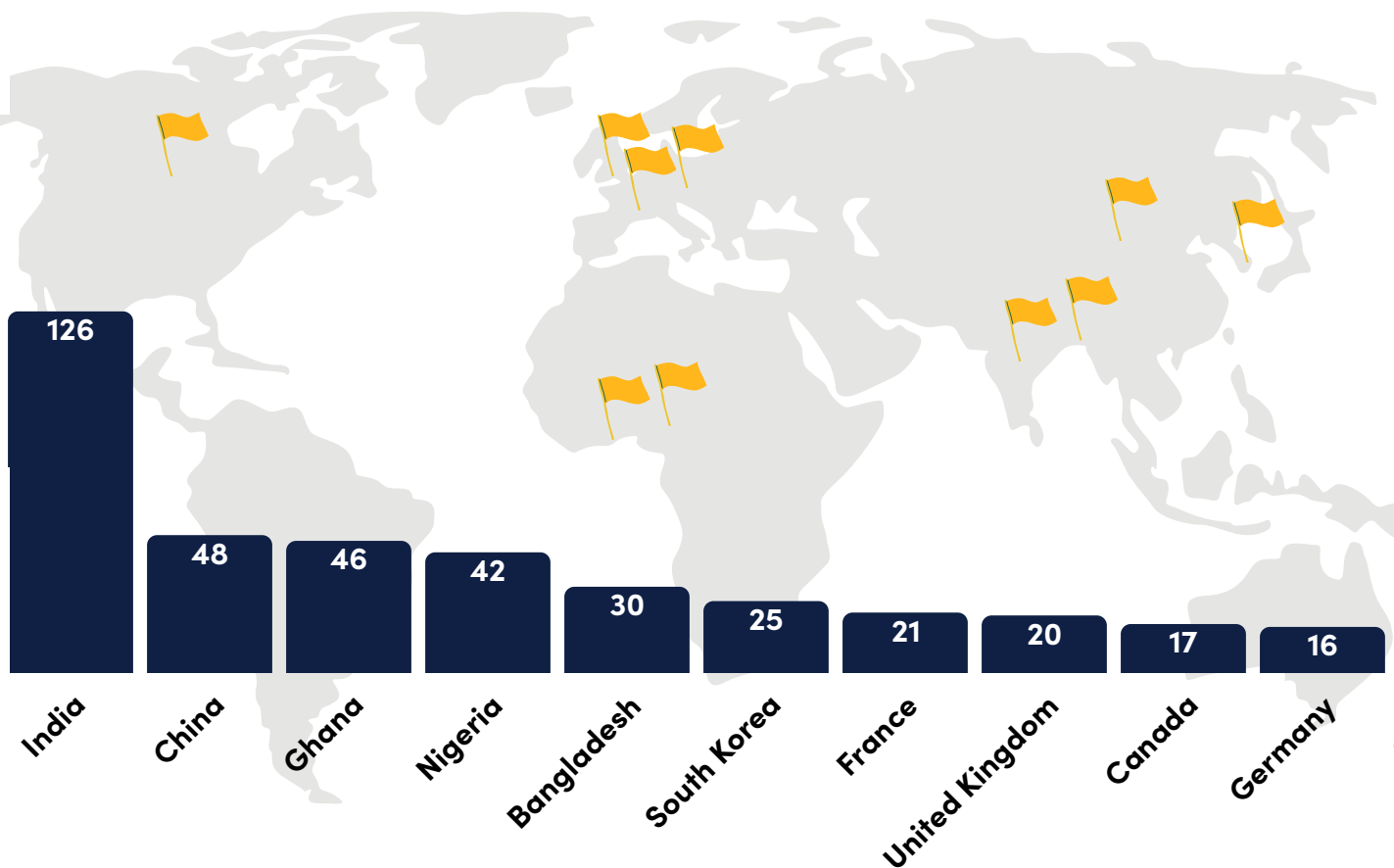
International Students and Scholars at UNC Greensboro

The J-1 Research Scholar Program

This program is designed to welcome visiting scholars to the United States for the purpose of engaging in research, observation, or consultation related to research projects at U.S. institutions. The program's duration offers flexibility, ranging from 3 weeks to 5 years, catering to the needs of both short-term and long-term research endeavors. The program fosters a dynamic environment for the exchange of ideas, research, and mutual enrichment between the United States and foreign countries. This collaboration strengthens linkages between research and educational institutions, forging lasting partnerships and advancing knowledge globally. UNC Greensboro hosted 34 new visiting international scholars on campus from 18 countries and hosted by 11 academic departments.



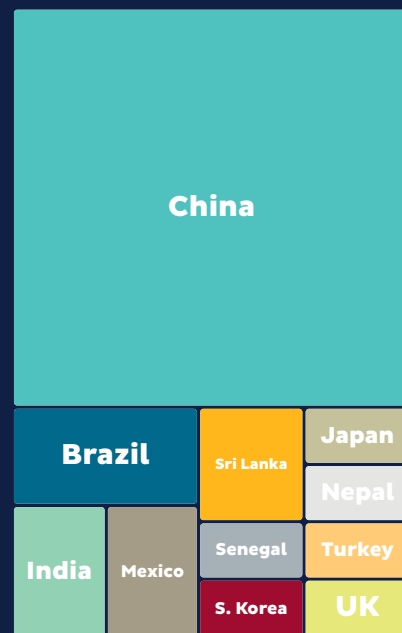
Dr. Ashraf Alsagheer, visiting scholar from India, was awarded the 2nd best poster prize at the annual Catalyst Symposium at the North Carolina Research Campus. (scholar recognition) Dr. Ashraf also published a research paper in Analytical Chemistry, discovering a new gas phase chemistry that can pinpoint the carbon-carbon double bond position in lipids. UNCG host: Dr. Qibin Zhang, Center for Translational Biomedical Research

Dr. Ingrid Martinez Aldino, visiting scholar from Mexico and hosted by Dr. Nadja Cech in Chemistry, collected and interpreted the spectroscopic data that is employed to determine the structure of a molecule present in the human skin microbiome that helps to prevent colonization by bacterial pathogens. Dr. Martinez Aldino's work forms the foundation for future development of new treatments for bacterial infections.



Dr. Shivprasad Suresh Patil, visiting scholar from India, published a research paper in Journal of Proteome Research, focusing on human blood plasma derived extracellular vesicles. UNCG host: Dr. Qibin Zhang, Center for Translational Biomedical Research

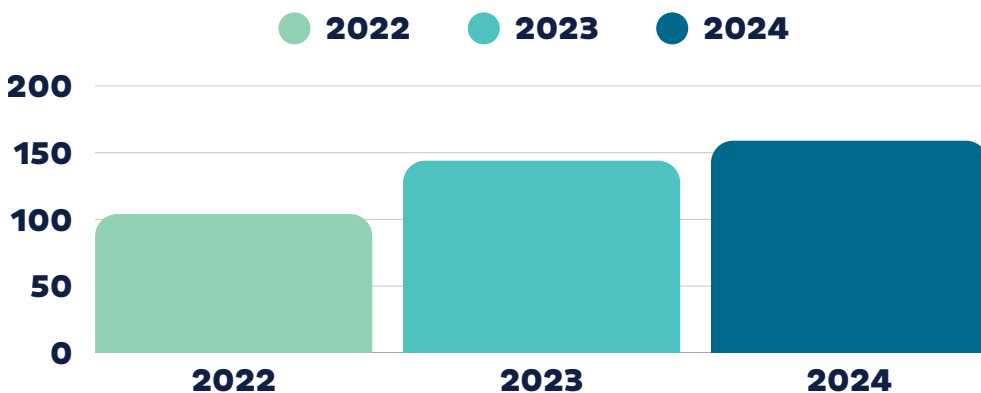
Top 3 sending countries for F-1 Degree-Seeking Students

OPT is a temporary employment authorization that allows international students with F-1 or M-1 visas to work in the United States after they graduate from a U.S.-accredited academic institution.

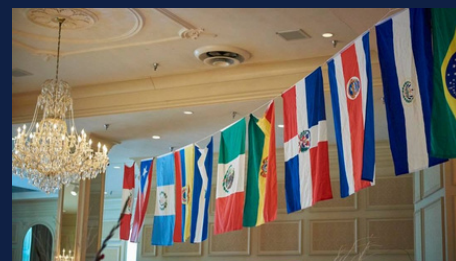

The Study Abroad Office at UNC Greensboro supports students in pursuing international learning opportunities that enrich their academic, professional, and personal growth. The office helps students explore a wide range of programs, including semester and year-long exchanges, faculty-led short-term courses, and summer programs in destinations around the world. Staff provide guidance on selecting programs that align with students' academic goals, navigating the application process, and preparing for life abroad through pre-departure orientations. They also assist with credit transfer, financial planning, scholarship opportunities, and guidance on leveraging skills and experiences to prepare for the workforce.

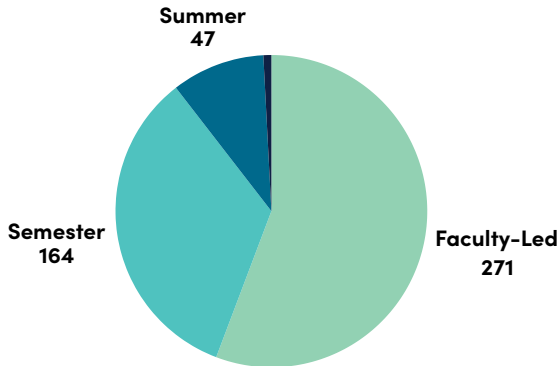

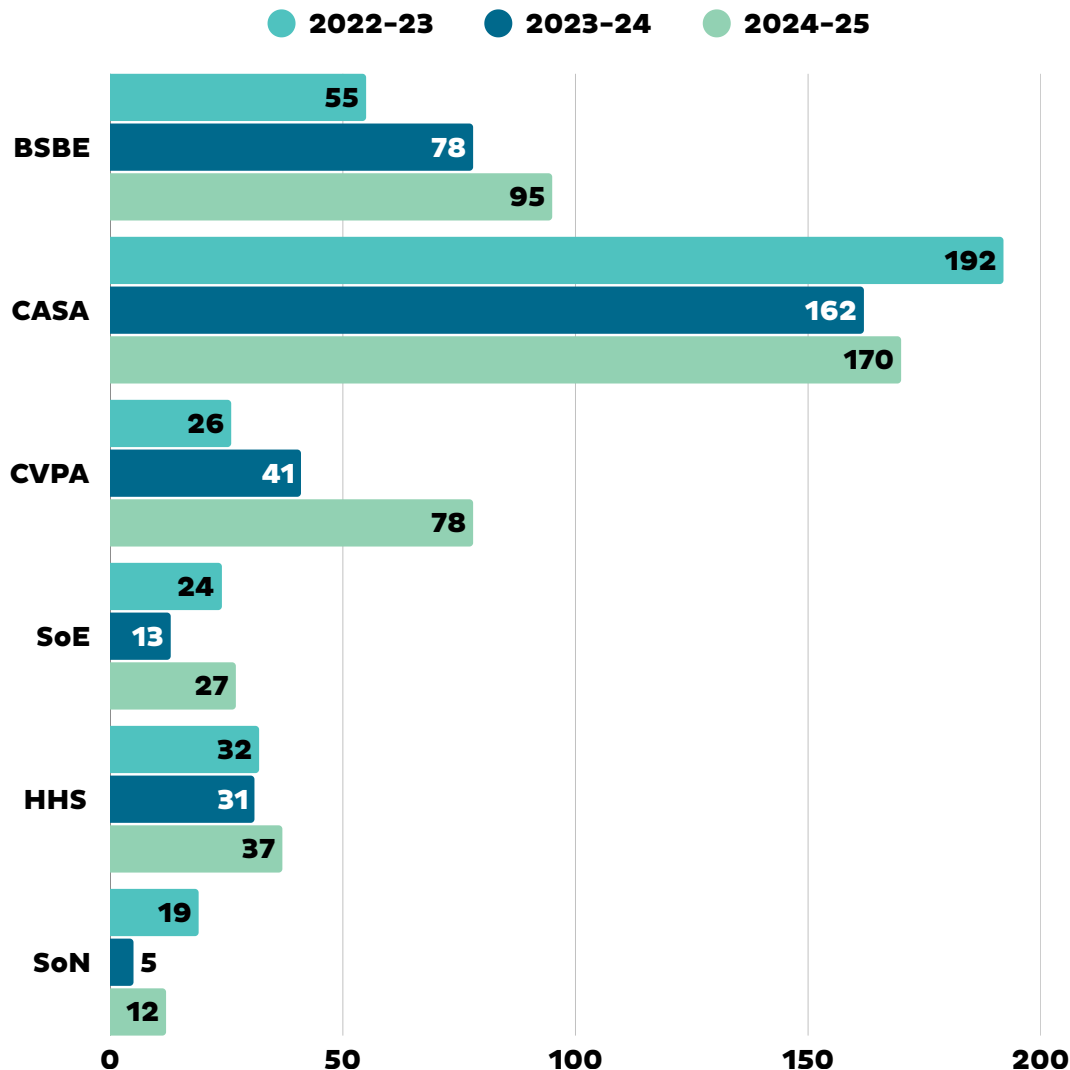

UNCG Travel Grants for Students

Travel Grants are awarded from funds established by generous donors to UNCG and managed by the Global Engagement Office, Lloyd International Honors College, the Bryan School of Business and Economics, the Languages, Literatures, and Cultures, Philosophy, and Religious Studies Departments for the benefit of students studying abroad.

Kohler Awards

The Kohler Endowment is dedicated to the support of comprehensive internationalization efforts at UNC Greensboro. The endowment was created with generous support of Mrs. Phyllis Penn Kohler and her husband, U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler. The Global Engagement Office allocates a set amount of money annually from the Kohler Fund for awards to faculty and staff global engagement activities.

ITF Awards

The Provost's Office created the International Travel Fund to support faculty to attend international conferences, present their work to an international audience, and interact with colleagues from other countries. The Office of Research and Engagements provides generous support for these awards

Fulbright

The Fulbright U.S. Student Program helps expand perspectives through academic and professional advancement and cross-cultural dialogue in partnership with more than 140 countries worldwide. The program is open to all academic disciplines to passionate and accomplished graduating college seniors, graduate students, and young professionals from all backgrounds. This year UNCG hosted 3 Fulbright visiting scholars. Two faculty members were awarded a Fulbright Scholar award and 1 student was awarded a Fulbright Student award.

Global Symposium

In celebration of UNC Greensboro's many decades of global engagement success, GEO hosted its very first Global Symposium on April 4, 2025! Nominations were collected for the following award categories:

Global Engagement Champion Award: This accolade honors individuals, including UNCG staff, friends and alumni, who have demonstrated exceptional commitment to global engagement and have exhibited leadership in supporting the University's global engagement, reputation, and excellence.

Faculty Global Excellence Award: Presented to a faculty member or a group of faculty members who have demonstrated excellence in advancing global engagement through innovative projects, programs, or other internationally focused activities.

Student Global Impact Award: This recognition celebrates students, including undergraduates, graduates, international students, and visiting scholars, who have made significant contributions to our local and international communities through their studies, internships, or other forms of global community engagement activities.





Fulbright Teaching Excellence and Achievement

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro (UNCG) is one of seven universities in the US selected to host a six-week Fulbright Teaching Excellence and Achievement (TEA) Program for 21 secondary school teachers. Fulbright TEA participants foster positive interactions with Americans throughout their time in the United States, especially in American classrooms. All program participants have opportunities to observe, co-teach, and share their expertise in U.S. secondary schools. They are master teachers of English, English as a foreign language, science, mathematics, and social studies, including special education in those subject areas. Fulbright TEA is funded by the U.S. government, supported by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) of the U.S. Department of State, and administered by IREX. The Global Engagement Office and the School of Education collaborate to implement the program at UNCG.



Global Visiting Scholar Program

As a world-class institution, UNC Greensboro welcomes faculty and researchers from around the world. The Exchange Visitor Program, administered by the U.S. Department of State, allows UNCG to use the J-1 Exchange Visitor immigration classification to invite or employ visiting scholars including foreign professors, research scholars, short-term scholars and specialists in the U.S. temporarily.

Global UGrad

The Global Undergraduate Exchange Program (also known as the Global UGRAD Program) provides one semester scholarships to outstanding undergraduate students from around the world for non-degree full-time study combined with community service, professional development, and cultural enrichment.

China: New Partnerships on the Horizon

In December 2024 a group of 10 UNCG faculty, staff and students visited several Chinese institutions, including Jiangxi Normal University, Wuhan Haiden Foreign Language International School, and Hubei University, to explore potential collaboration opportunities with UNCG.

On August 2–3, 2025, UNCG welcomed a delegation from Zhejiang Industry & Trade Vocational College for their first U.S. visit. The two institutions explored collaboration in Computer Science, shared academic insights, and built cross-cultural connections — including a special gathering hosted by Dr. Anastasiou at her home.
